Welcome to Extra Credit, hosted by the Rutgers University Office of Summer and Winter Sessions. Thank you for coming to our Microcast. Can I ask you to introduce yourself please?

Sure, my name is Martin Smith and I'm a professor at Rutgers University.

Awesome, so I hear you'll be teaching a summer course, can you tell me a little bit about it?

It's a course in topics in world languages and the title of the course is Teaching Content Lessons from Dual Language Immersion, so in the course what we'll be doing is looking at the literature around teaching in immersion settings and then use the lens to be able to determine how we could use that information to teach in any world languages classroom.

So, can you walk me through the process behind developing this course? Why do you think it's necessary? Why do you think it's needed?

Well, I think it's needed, first off because there is no course like this being offered currently as far as I know in New Jersey and in fact, there are very few courses, like this across the country.

But in my own journey over the decades in the area of world languages, I became more and more interested in dual language immersion.

I first heard about it back at the in the 90s. When I was tasked with being able to put together an elementary language program. And while the program I was putting together at that time was not an immersion program, in putting together that program I started to visit programs- visited some immersion programs and it really sparked my interest in wanting to understand it better, so I started reading, I started studying, I started looking at programs more often.

And then just over the decades, I just became more and more interested in that to the point where in my last full-time job, I was the assistant Superintendent for curriculum and instruction in the school district. And I worked with the Board of Education to ultimately implement a dual language immersion program in both Chinese and Spanish.

So, I've gone from studying it because I thought we could learn a lot about it, to actually implementing the program.

So how does the program work exactly? So, what makes it different than, say you know your one-off English course or something?

So rather than it being a one-off course where you're studying the language as a part of study – in a dual language class, you're studying your content areas such as Mathematics, Science, Social Studies, Music, Art, whatever the content area is but using the language as the means to access the content within that area and language acquisition, then develops as a natural process out of that.

So, learning how to make all of that content comprehensible is something that we can leverage within our world languages classrooms to be able to do a better job in developing our student's language proficiency.

Right, right.

Well, that's really interesting, that's cool. A lot of work, I'm sure, but good for you for pursuing and you know, keep going forward.

A lot of fun work [laughs].

So, what would you say students taking this course? What would the main takeaway be for them, do you think?

Well, what I'm hoping is that one, they'll become more conversant with the literature in the area of dual language immersion and how teachers who work in that do the work that they do.

So that they could leverage it in their regular world language classrooms and therefore improve the quality of instruction.

Wow, it sounds very interesting.

Teaching of languages has always been a tremendous passion that I've had in my life so. Well, yes, it can be looked at as a lot of work at the same time because I'm so passionate about bringing the ability to speak other languages to students.

Um, and it's been a driving passion of my entire life. It's really when all is said and done it's- it feeds the soul and it's just fun to do so. It's work, but at the same time, it's the work you want to do.

Uhm, so with COVID and you know, everything being remote, what would some advice you would give to promote good communication in a remote environment, say between you and your students?

One of the things that I learned— I taught a course last summer online for the first time, fully online. And one of the things I learned is at times, you have to give up a little bit of the content within the course to be able to spend some time developing cohesion and relationships among the students, and yourself and the students within the class.

And at times, we tend to be driven by the content, like "I need to cover this and I need to cover that."

But one of the things I've really learned is that if you don't have the connections with your students. The learning is never going to stick.

So I've learned to give up some of the content in order to make sure that we have strong connections.

I can totally see how that would apply. Yeah, I've never heard of professors say that, like just off the bat, they're usually more content driven.

Yeah, well. Content matters and I- you know, I have this passion for dual language immersion, so I'll stay focused on that.

But you know, to me, it's not about how much material you cover but rather that what you do cover you cover well. And I've just always learned that if you don't have strong relationships and the students don't connect to the material and to the people within the class, it ultimately doesn't really stick and people don't do anything with it.

And to me, to take a course simply for the sake of taking a course and getting the credits and getting a degree isn't worthwhile. I'm very pragmatic in that sense to me if you're working full time

And then you're taking a course that you're hoping will get you better at that job, it better get you better at that job or it wasn't worth the investment of time.
