Hi Kyle, thanks for joining us today. If, for anyone who doesn't know, Kyle works with us in the Office of Summer and Winter Session, so Kyle can you introduce yourself to us? Tell-

I'm Kyle Canete. I graduated from Rutgers University in May of 2019 and I am currently the research specialist for the Office of Summer and Winter sessions. Like, you could also call me a data analyst too at the same time.

And yeah, after graduating from Rutgers, I spent, I spent a quick while working in the corporate world and then once this opportunity came up, I- I didn't hesitate to hop back into higher education. Um, learned a lot of good things in the corporate world, but nothing beats you know, the fulfillment of working in higher education.

Um, just the fact that you know the work you do is very relatable, especially from a recent grad and higher education is just like something that morally and fulfilling wise, you know, is something that would make your work valuable, which was something I was missing in the corporate world, so I'm really happy to be back.

That's awesome, I'm glad that you're finding fulfillment here.

It, it can be hard in the corporate world, you know, but I don't know it can- it depends on the company, I feel.

Yeah. So, what was your major for your undergrad?

Uh, my major was in business analytics and information technology. Uh, my previous- like when I transferred into Rutgers, I came in as an accounting student. Maybe I lasted one semester as an accounting major and then switched to BAIT, which is like, Business, Analytics, and Information Technology and like um yeah, I don't regret it. You know I, I like what I do, I like what I learned. I met some great people, learned from like great professors.

And here I am, like making use of my degree, and um... yeah.

Yeah, 100 percent, 100 percent.

So, like what does a business analyst do?

There's two I would say, at least for me, 'cause that was my title in the corporate world, "Business Analyst."

What we do is basically we are the middleman between a software/tech team that builds software, that builds whatever the product is for the company, and the end users or the stakeholders, of that software/product, we're the middleman. We gather their requirements from the stakeholders, and then we turn it into a language that, you know, software- that software developers understand.

And then they do their work. They build it based on what we give them and then, uh, we show it back to the stakeholders. Get feedback, if there is feedback, we go back to the devs and then just a lot of back and forth.

It's not a technical role at all, at least in my experience. It's more of people skills, more of learning how to talk, tech, learning how to talk business at the same time between two different people and um-

It was fun. It was fun, a lot of meetings, *a lot* of meetings, a lot of talking, a lot of interacting with people, a lot of studying too, like you have to know your product to be able to talk about it to stakeholders and to software developers.

And then a lot of, uhm, time management 'cause like sometimes you can be assigned to one product. Sometimes you can be assigned to 3, 4, or 5 at the same time.

I can't imagine the meetings. I really can't like that-

It's a lot of meetings, a lot of back forth, a lot of emails.

And yeah, but I mean like emailing, right? That's like, the backbone of like, work. You know, like you know like big whatever job or whatever out of college. But I feel like, the meetings, like I see so many memes about meetings like- like this could have been an email. You know what I'm saying? Like there's literally notebooks and like T shirts with like these like memes about meetings are in.

So yeah, like you can be, I feel like you- there's a, there's like you have to understand that there's never going to be an end to your emails, but like you can easily become overloaded with meetings sometimes.

Keep- keeping like note taking-

Like it's huge because one of the- one of the things that you don't want to do is forget something from a meeting that like propels you to either start another meeting or start like another email chain out of all the other emails that you go through, out of all the like meetings that you have on your schedule. And like taking good notes was huge.

Like, especially with hour long meetings.

It's a lot.

And you need to take all of the information that the stakeholders give you, because if you miss something.

And you forget to tell it to the devs like it could, you know, hold you back a bit.

Yeah yeah, I have- like meetings that I have now, I'll like create basically an outline like in a Word document and then I can just like go up and down. You know, like depending on where the conversation in the meeting goes.

OK so then, when did you start? So, I know you started as an accounting major at Rutgers, but did you start at Rutgers as a freshman? Or did you transfer in?

I transferred in from community college. It's actually funny.

When I was a senior in high school, I wasn't really thinking about college, so even from high school I couldn't like even get into Rutgers.

So, I chose the community college route. I was a business admin, so basically, they had a program that, you know, is designed for you to transfer. So, I wasn't an accounting major.

But you know, ultimately, I wanted to transfer somewhere... specifically, Rutgers, like Rutgers, is what I was eyeing from the beginning.

I, like, from the beginning, I was working towards transferring to Rutgers, looking at their requirements, making sure I was like above what they required. And then ultimately, I was able to get in and I have no regrets.

Awesome, so then, when you were talking about what a business analyst does, you said that that was like what you did in your corporate job.

Uhm, the biggest reason? I have two reasons. One, I like data. I like working with data. I like being into the weeds of things and into a more technical role.

That's kind of what I wanted, which was something you know, my previous roles didn't provide. It was more just communicating rather than technical.

And you know... like I said earlier, the fulfillment of working within a higher education, education setting. Because one thing that you kind of lose in the corporate world, depending on the company, is just being driven by what you, what you do, or ultimately like the mission of what you're doing and back in-

You know, when I was taking classes on that, I would say, "Oh yeah, mission statement. Yeah, whatever. Whatever, like it's whatever." But then getting into it, getting into like the workforce full time like that like you start to realize how much that actually like impacts and employee impacts yourself.

...within the higher education setting, um, I find huge fulfillment on what I do and also like the convenience of it, is that down the line in my life I do wanna end up going the teaching route.

Like that's a huge like, that's a huge goal of mine, like that's something-

You'd be such a good teacher like you're so personable-

Yeah, because like one thing I want to do, like one thing. The reason why I wanted to be a teacher, I was inspired by one of my high school teachers. Uhm, she's the reason why I decided to do accounting from the beginning and I'm just like the thing about her is, how could you make such a boring subject so fun?

And I'm just like...

I really do, at no matter what level you teach, I think you'll be great. You have such a, like a calming like, vibe that you give off like you should, yeah- yeah, you know.

And I feel like- I feel like it's like people need that, like you, like teachers need that 'cause they can get like what, whatever grade you teach, right... I feel like it varies like, depending on the grade, but like whatever grade, there is a minimum of like chaos you know and so like you have to just be like, "OK. This is happening. Let's roll," and like you could totally do that. And then I think too, like you're super easy to talk to, you know.
